


Springfield Trail

The Trail's Origin

According to *Fifty Hikes in Eastern Pennsylvania*, 2nd Edition, published in 1989, the trail's first hike took place in 1969, but was formally established in 1965 through a collaborative effort to secure rights to cross public and private properties.

Fifty Hikes references the Springfield Trail Club, which, according to area residents, was disbanded a number of years ago.

Trail Length

According to Fifty Hikes, the trail was described as 4.5 miles in length, but, according to various GPS measurements, we believe that it is closer to 6 miles.



Trailheads

According to Fifty Hikes, the trail's starting and ending point was on James Lane, which is off of West Woodland Avenue and just above Kovacs Funeral Home.

As of today, there are eleven informal access points, being:

Paper Mill Road – at the end of the road near the ball fields and I-476 overpass

Pine Ridge Road

Paper Mill Road – near Paper Mill stop on SEPTA Route 101 trolley line

Springfield Mall

Thomson Park

Lewis Road – near Gleaves Road

E.T. Richardson Middle School

James Lane

C.C. Hancock Memorial Methodist Church

Jane Lownes Park
